Teacup Cricket Series Summary

After restarting high school cricket, Saltus and CedarBridge competed in a thrilling three-match series. This was the second consecutive year that cricket was played between the Senior Schools in 14 years:

1. 1st Match – Saltus 90/2 vs CedarBridge 83/4 (T15)
2. 2nd Match – CedarBridge 129/8 vs Saltus 102/7 (T15)
3. 3rd Match – CedarBridge 74/10 vs Saltus 77/2 (T20)

CBA emerged victorious, winning 2 games to 1.

Sponsors and Partnerships

The BCB acknowledges the much-needed support received from Centennial Bermuda for their generous support in aiding to launch the Cricket in Schools Program.

Cricket is officially integrated into Bermuda schools' annual curriculum, as confirmed by ICC documentation. The program spans across multiple educational levels, ensuring widespread participation and development.

- Primary Schools: 17 institutions (~1,851 students)
- Middle Schools: 3 institutions (~718 students)
- High Schools: 2 institutions (~1,005 students)

This represents approximately 1,746 female students and 1,824 male students actively engaged in cricket. Students receive 6–8 structured lessons combining theory and practical sessions. These lessons are supported by professional coaching, inter-school competitions, and partnerships with local clubs and the Bermuda Cricket Board (BCB). The

objective is to nurture talent, foster teamwork, and maintain Bermuda's cricketing tradition while promoting physical education and life skills.

Future Outlook

The BCB aims to continue expanding cricket programs, enhance coaching resources, and foster pride in representing schools. Our goal is to develop well-rounded student-athletes and strengthen Bermuda's cricket culture.
